STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This year, within the course of History of Political Thought, we largely debated about democracy. We have explored fundamental questions such as: what is democracy, and how should it be defined? Is democratic a universal notion, or should it be adapted to the unique histories, traditions, and cultural contexts of different societies? And, perhaps most importantly, does democracy truly work in today's world?

These questions are more than theoretical—they shape the way societies govern, resolve conflicts, and pursue justice. While democracy is often upheld as the ideal political system, we must ask: is it always the best institutional arrangement and form of government? In practice, does it deliver on its promises of representation, equality, and stability? Or are there flaws in democratic governance that we must critically address?

To explore these issues, we have organized this Global Forum as a space for discussion and debate. We invite you to critically examine democracy—not just as a principle, but as a system in action. Let's challenge assumptions, consider alternatives, and rethink what governance should look like in our rapidly changing world.
